

## ADOBE SPRINGS INTERPRETIVE PROGRAM

For the fourth year in a row, ALPS hosted local 3rd grade students at Adobe Springs for docent led field trips which cover subjects required for their local history education. Santa Margarita Elementary attended on April 9 and San Gabriel Elementary on April 10. Between the two schools ALPS hosted 130 students.

ALPS provides the schools with the curriculum, experiments and docent-led field trip to Adobe Springs.

The field trip stations focus on local history topics that include learning about the Native Americans who lived in the area for centuries, the Anza Expedition passing by on March 4, 1776, and the Estrada Adobe built in 1812 as an outpost to Mission San Miguel. Other stations provide interactive programs to learn about the native plants found at Adobe Springs and how to identify and reconstruct a deer skeleton. The common element connecting all of these living things is the spring where the students learned about the water that has flowed continuously for centuries. Want to help?
