THIS LAST WINTER IT RAINED . . . A LOT!

This last winter we all received a lot of much needed rain that helped fill up local reservoirs and replenish ground water supplies. Unfortunately it also caused damage to property that resided along steep hillsides and creeks.

The Three Bridges Oak Preserve trailhead was completely flooded during the downpour in early January causing a lot of damage. Vegetation and debris were deposited all over the trailhead and on the fences. The flooding ripped out much of the fence along the creek by the kiosk. The rushing water gouged out the creek bank by the kiosk while depositing large amounts of silt and sand in other areas. The ADA pathway from the parking lot to the kiosk was washed away along with many plants and trees.



We began the cleanup with a workday on January 28 and were elated when 58 volunteers showed up to help! The volunteers removed debris from the trailhead and off of the fences,



shoveled silt and sand off the pavement, and filled in large holes and the creek bank that had been eroded away. In total 40 yards of debris was removed and placed into a large dumpster!

In the following weeks the ALPS Trail Crew volunteers worked very hard to get the trailhead ready to open. They repaired the ADA path and removed additional debris. Next they replaced broken fence posts and filled in large holes where flood waters eroded the creek bank. The perimeter fence near the kiosk was washed away and had to be rebuilt. The path under the

Hwy 41 overpass had a large buildup of gravel that was removed and smoothed out. The path between the overpass and creek crossing was repaired. The trails were cleared of debris and drainages rebuilt. On April 20 the crew rebuilt the rock creek crossing and opened the gates!

ADOBE SPRINGS INTERPRETIVE PROGRAM

Last April ALPS provided docent led field trips for 177 local 3rd grade students on topics covering subjects pertaining to their local history education. Students from San Benito Road Elementary, San Gabriel and Santa Margarita Elementary Schools attended.

OTHER ACTIVITIES SUDDEN OAK DEATH SURVEY

ALPS volunteers supported the county wide Sudden Oak Death (SOD) Blitz. The volunteers surveyed Bay Laurel trees located within Three Bridges Oak Preserve. The California Bay Laurel tree is a vector for the pathogen which can be transmitted to nearby Live Oak trees. SOD is a funguslike tree disease that has killed millions of oak trees in coastal counties north of San Luis Obispo County.
