THREE BRIDGES OAK PRESERVE

Three Bridges Oak Preserve was part of the **Atascadero Colony** and was made up of three residential lots. Due to steepness of the property, homes were never build on any of the lots.

The property was owned by the Davis Family until it was purchased by ALPS in 2011 with grants from the California Natural Resources Agency and from Caltrans.

ALPS appreciates the natural state in which this property was preserved by the Davis Family.

ALPS received grant funding from the California Natural Resources Agency in 2012 for the construction of trails, trailhead and signage. After years of designing, planning and construction, the trail system was opened to the public in 2017.
