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farming equipment and information detaining dehydrating food and planting trees.

The main feature was centered on discussion and explanation of land issues. Extensive planning was employed from the beginning; experts in land use were engaged. The process took two years and a quarter million dollars to complete. The laying out of the orchards, the soils tests, the determination of adaptability and water availability was considered vitally important information for the prospective buyers of land. A map was finalized and provided suggestions showing where to plant each fruit or nut type. The final step after land selection would be to go to the land trust office for purchase price.
