

### PRESIDENT'S NOTE - MATURATION

Pressures to develop open spaces have ebbed with the economy in the past couple of years, but land preservation in these times still requires dedication, energy, and planning. The ALPS Board has continued to provide those qualities, but like the land itself organizations need nurturance and direction. It's hard to believe, but I agreed to be president of the ALPS Board of Directors for a year in 2002. In the ensuing eight years, ALPS has begun to mature as an organization. As a child psychiatrist, I often talk about the "job description" of parents: to raise your children to be independent adults, which involves a certain degree of letting go and passing the baton to the next generation. Now at age 18, ALPS is entering its adulthood. We have enthusiastic new Board members, and I'll be passing the president's gavel to Bruce Bonifas. While Bruce isn't exactly a new generation, he has the energy of an 18-year-old, and he has retired from a really productive career of service in the California Conservation Corps, so he will have time to devote to ALPS.

ALPS is, as its name reflects, a land preservation organization. Its mission is to obtain and preserve open space in Atascadero for future generations. Our plans to purchase the largest acquisition in our history, the Davis/Atascadero Creek property off Highway 41, have followed a roller coaster course, and State budget woes have put that acquisition on temporary (we hope) hold. This has given your Board an opportunity to focus on stewardship of the land currently in the ALPS inventory. In 2010, we will be developing land management plans for our three holdings – Stadium Lane, Adobe Springs, and Atascadero Creek Reservation – that are designed to nurture those lands and to increase their value to the public. We plan to broaden our volunteer base and to develop schedules for required maintenance tasks. In the spirit of our deceased founder, Marj Mackey, Friends of Stadium Park has been formed as an ALPS committee "to work toward the environmental, historical and natural preservation" of the park, which was the reason ALPS came into existence.

## BOTANICAL TRAIL

Last Spring ALPS planted 30 native plants along the lower part of our Botanical Trail in Stadium Lane. This was done in conjunction with Atascadero Native Tree Association (ANTA), and the California Conservation Corps (CCC). Most of the plants did quite well through the hot summer, although there were a few casualties. A drip irrigation system had been installed which was a necessity, especially for the new plants. We have replaced our losses. Plans are now underway to develop Phase 2 of our project, the next triangle between the switchbacks of our trail. Recent rain and cooler weather have made this an ideal time to put in our next group of plants, most of which will be characterized as "Chaparral" species.

Future plans include signage so that people can become familiar with the names of the plants, and development of a bulletin board at the Kiosk existing at the start of the Trail. We hope that these efforts will help people become more familiar with the native plants which do well in this area, and to utilize them in their gardens as attractive as well as water-saving landscaping.
